Dear Chairwoman Willingham:

Thank you for the opportunity to present the Albany County Crime Victim and Sexual Violence Center (CVSVC)'s proposed 2025 budget. I am writing to provide the information requested by the Audit & Finance Committee:

- 1. The **department representative** appearing before the Audit & Finance Committee for CVSVC's budget presentation will be me, Amanda Wingle, Director.
- 2. Vacant positions in the department as of October 16, 2024: A4610 12233 002 450024 Crime Victim Therapist (Child) A4610 12239 001 450013 Prevention Educator A4320 12239 001 200027 Prevention Educator (this position is listed under account 4320 because it is being funded through opioid settlement funds)

3. New positions:

CVSVC plans to add an additional Prevention Educator to implement the Communities Mobilizing for Safety project (funding: 100% grant funded by New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) Bureau of Perinatal, Reproductive, and Sexual Health). While the hope is to hire someone prior to the end of 2024, full legislative approval for this initiative had not occurred at the time of budget preparation, which is why the position is not included in the 2025 budget.

4. Proposed salary increase(s) beyond union contract commitments:

A4610 12232 001 450003 Clinical Supervisor

This employee is receiving a salary increase because she has taken on additional responsibilities which were not included in the job description when she took the position in 2016. Since 2016, CVSVC has grown our program in many ways, including the addition of two case managers, transferring many clinical operations to the White Cottage, and the addition of various community education initiatives. This employee has been instrumental in orchestrating and implementing these changes, as well as supervising the staff involved.

Additional responsibilities not included in the employee's job description have included or will include the following:

- Supervision of the two case managers and implementation and oversight of the case management program (added in 2018), including conducting case management intake interviews to determine program eligibility
- Supervision of members of the community team, such as the prevention educators, volunteer coordinator, and campus coordinator, and implementation and oversight of community education initiatives (ex. College campus program, volunteer program)
- Will be supervising two of the three new prevention educators added in 2024-25, and assisting them with creation and implementation of their programs
- Oversaw transition of clinical operations to White Cottage
- Coordination of crisis response to local schools (immediately following a traumatic event that affects the entire school community, therapists provide crisis counseling at the school to teachers, students, and staff)

This employee started with CVSVC in 2002 and possesses a tremendous amount of clinical and institutional knowledge. She is an excellent supervisor and support for frontline staff. She is a tremendous asset to our agency.

9. New initiatives and eliminated programs:

CVSVC is proud to be introducing several new initiatives:

- Youth Violence Prevention and Response Community Initiative (funding: Albany County Department of Economic Development, Conservation and Planning as part of the Albany County Improvement Initiative)
- Opioid Use Disorder Education and Prevention Initiative (funding: Opioids Settlement fund)
- Communities Mobilizing for Safety (funding: 100% grant funded by New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) Bureau of Perinatal, Reproductive, and Sexual Health)
- Rideshare transportation for clients to/from locations such as 112 State St., White Cottage, hospital, police station, court, DSS, etc. (funding: ARPA funds)

- 11. **Conferences/Training/Tuition breakdown**: All proposed funding for all Conferences/Training/Tuition line items is mandated by the grantors and is 100% funded by them.
- 12. Overtime Line Items: None
- 13. **Positions established/changed during the 2024 fiscal year**: A4610 12239 001 450013 Prevention Educator

This position is 100% funded by the Albany County Department of Economic Development, Conservation and Planning as part of the Albany County Improvement Initiative. This Prevention Educator will facilitate the County Youth Violence Prevention and Response Community Initiative.

A4320 12239 001 200027 Prevention Educator

This position is listed under account 4320 because it is being 100% funded through opioid settlement funds. However, this employee will be a CVSVC staff member facilitating the CVSVC Opioid Use Disorder Education and Prevention Initiative.

14. Risk Assessment:

As a heavily grant-funded agency, the biggest risk facing CVSVC is the potential loss of grant funding. We mitigate this risk by continuing to aggressively pursue new grant opportunities. For example, in 2024 we pursued the NYSDOH Communities Mobilizing for Safety grant and were awarded \$722,500, which will be divided over a total of 4 years and 3 months until January 2029. We will continue to pursue grant opportunities.

Another way we mitigate this risk is by lobbying our state officials to maintain or increase grant amounts for victim services agencies. It is anticipated that there will be reductions in federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funding for New York State. CVSVC was part of a group of victim services agencies which successfully advocated for a "VOCA fix" to be included in Governor Kathy Hochul's FY2025 budget. This \$20 million in state funding will ensure the continued availability of direct services for victims and survivors of crime across the state, and maintain funding for victim services programs such as CVSVC. Recently CVSVC also signed onto a letter supporting increased funding for human services providers, specifically a 7.8% increase in funding across human services providers, to be included in Gov. Hochul's SFY 2025-26 Executive Budget Proposal. This would help to offset increasing expenses faced by human services providers such as CVSVC, such as rising costs due to inflation and union contracted raises.

15. Performance Indicators and Metrics:

16. Unfunded mandates and risks to revenues/reimbursements:

There are no new unfunded mandates.

The biggest risk to revenues is loss of grant funding, as outlined in item 14. The biggest risk to reimbursements is New York State's continued issues with the new State Financial System (SFS). This system is where we are supposed to upload progress reports, vouchers, etc. for many of our grants, but some of our grantor agencies have struggled to make the transition to SFS and many functions (including voucher submission) are currently unavailable. CVSVC continues to work with Management & Budget and the

state agencies to rectify this issue. Internally we are up-to-date on all progress reports and vouchers so they can be submitted as soon as the system allows.

CVSVC aims to provide high-quality services utilizing grant funding to the extent possible to minimize financial burden on Albany County and its taxpayers. Appendix C: Performance Indicators and Metrics

From October 2023-September 2024, CVSVC provided approximately 23,000 services to survivors of crime in Albany County to approximately 4000 clients.

- We provided crisis intervention 1,318 times.
- We assisted clients on our sexual assault crisis hotline 1,865 times.
- We provided emergency room accompaniment to crime victims for forensic exams 354 times.
- We provided criminal justice advocacy and support 4,230 times.
- We provided information and referrals 13,871 times.
- We provided therapy 739 times.
- We provided personal advocacy 625 times.

CVSVC also provides group support in various settings in the community.

- 55 individuals participated in our Breaking Barriers program at Albany County Correctional Facility (ACCF).
- 61 individuals participated in our Not a Number (anti-human trafficking) groups at a variety of locations, including St. Anne's Institute and Capital District Juvenile Secure Detention Facility.
