The primary purpose of Junior Achievement of Northeastern New York (JANENY) is to empower, enrich, and inspire youth - building their financial literacy, enhancing their workforce readiness skills, guiding them to explore career pathways, and helping them create a dynamic vision for their futures. Our educational programming delivers innovative and interactive inschool lessons to more than 12,000 K-12 students annually by matching corporate and community volunteers with classrooms in need and top-notch curricula. Junior Achievement of Northeastern New York is proud to serve Albany County, its home county.

JA NENY is dedicated to giving young people in grades K-12 the knowledge and skills they need to achieve economic success, plan for their futures, and make smart academic and economic choices. The educational process includes working in groups to encourage collaboration, innovation, and critical thinking.

The goal of the project is to support Albany County students in more than 30 schools with programs that focus on financial literacy, career exploration / work readiness, and entrepreneurship in the elementary, middle, and high schools. Our primary constituents include students in the Albany, Cohoes, and Watervliet City School Districts, where the percentage of economically disadvantaged children is reported by the New York State Department of Education to be 71%, 69%, and 75%, respectively. The ethnicity of the population is also very diverse.

In the 2024 and 2025 calendar years, we aim to teach more than 3,200 Albany County students each year, for a total of more than 6,400. Most programs have at least 5 lessons each, so that's more than 32,000 lessons that will be provided, with countless family members experiencing the residual effects. The participating students will be better prepared for their futures and the many opportunities they can pursue, lifting our entire region. The education they experience today will help them to have a brighter future, unlocking their potential and empowering them for success.

If an award is made, describe how Albany County stakeholders will benefit.

Junior Achievement of Northeastern New York is proud to serve Albany County. Our programming inspires young people to succeed and equips them with the skillset and mindset to build thriving communities. The young people of Albany County will benefit by an increase in their financial literacy, workforce readiness, and experiences in career exploration. The greater population of Albany County will benefit by the leaders of tomorrow being better prepared to improve the quality of life for all who live and work here. We aim to unlock the potential for all students, their families, their neighbors, and everyone's future.

The business landscape in Albany County will be enhanced due to the JA NENY workforce readiness programs. For example, in the fall of 2023, National Grid and JA NENY presented a full day of career exploration at Harmony Hill Elementary School in Cohoes. Teaching financial literacy also played a role, and National Grid employees spoke about their jobs and showcased their large equipment. JA NENY plans to continue these partner programs with Albany County employers to feed the pipeline for future workers.

- 75% say it played an important role in their career path.

- ^ The Bowlathon historically raised \$150,00 \$160,000 annually pre-COVID. All momentum and structure for this high attendance event has been lost. JA NENY has lost the paid and volunteer staff to organize it, so we are introducing an alternate bowling event in 2024 we hope to build through the years.
- * Capital Region Business Hall of Fame netted \$135,951 in 2019. When COVID struck, fundraising had already been completed for 2020, and donors were generous when the in-person event was cancelled. Although all momentum has been lost, JANENY is working to rebuild the event for May 2024. We hope to build momentum through the years and return to its original success.
- # The Partners in Achievement luncheon brought individuals together to support the JA NENY mission. COVID quickly killed the event, and the essential corporate and community volunteers who made it happen have reprioritized their time.

- + As a result of COVID, all learning had to be changed from in-person to remote. Volunteers needed training to accommodate this significant change. Many volunteers chose not to transition to remote, and when the schools returned to in-person learning, they had reprioritized their time. New volunteers need to be recruited to replace them.

Sustainable Operating Model: Describe how your organization adapted its operations to respond to (a) the immediate impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and (b) any long-term trends brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Quickly after the onset of the global pandemic, JA NENY was able to shift our educational delivery model to provide fully virtual experiences for most programs. With the support of JA USA, a national organization to which we belong, JA NENY was providing asynchronous and e-learning programs for elementary, middle, and high school classes in our region, had launched an online portal for parents to lead at-home self-guided enrichment activities for all grade levels, and trained and equipped 159 volunteers for remote delivery.

In the long term, as students have returned full-time to the classroom, we have further adapted our educational programs, retaining the best of the best. Volunteers and teachers now have access to a full menu of in-person and virtual activities, to maximize the value of the programs and positive impact on the students.

Recruitment of both teaching and fundraising volunteers continues to be challenging. This is attributable to a variety of factors. Former volunteers have reallocated their time. Remote work has reduced the motivation to leave one's home. Corporations are trying to keep their belts tight, reducing or eliminating opportunities for their employees to volunteer. Every COVID scare refreshes the lingering fears of being in a confined space with many unknown people. To address this issue in part, some teachers in the upper grades are choosing to use JA NENY curriculum and lead the teaching when a volunteer is unavailable.

JA NENY is gradually rebuilding its staff to increase capacity. Staff departures during COVID eliminated both a full and part-time position. The part-time position has been reinstituted. Consideration will be given to returning to pre-COVID staffing levels as funding allows.

If an award is made, describe how the funds will help the organization to recover from the negative economic impacts associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and to sustain long-term operations in Albany County.

An award of funds will help JA NENY to continue to recover from the negative economic impacts associated with the COVID pandemic. Funds are needed to replace lost fundraising revenue, which will be done in part by rebuilding former events, and continue teaching volunteer recruitment and training so we can deliver more educational programs in Albany County. All students in our county deserve the opportunities, freedom, and dreams that financial literacy can provide. JA NENY would like to reach as many of them as possible.

Does the organization possess a financial management system that provides records that can identify the sources and application of ARPA funds if an award is made? Please explain below:

JA NENY's financial management system is QuickBooks Online, which is coordinated by our Operations Manager, with oversight from our President and external CPA. QuickBooks has all the functionality necessary to identify and track the ARPA funding. JA NENY has a full audit performed annually by an external auditor to ensure full compliance.

Please explain how the negative impact associated with the COVID-19 pandemic led to revenue loss:

The COVID-19 pandemic led to the departure of two employees, including a full-time Development Director, who had the responsibility of coordinating fundraising events. As the pandemic dissipated, the employee had obtained other employment, and her institutional memory of the past successful events was lost.

In 2019, pre-pandemic, 62% of Junior Achievement of Northeastern New York's revenue was generated from special events. When COVID eliminated gatherings, all were cancelled per government regulations. This significantly reduced our revenue stream.

In-person fundraising momentum was lost. Long-time event volunteers faded away. Corporate sponsors reduced budgets, and their employees no longer have a shared sense of corporate community due to remote working. Institutional memory of the planning of these successful events is fading. Despite these challenges, Junior Achievement of Northeastern New York is working on rebuilding our revenue stream. The Capital Region Hall of Fame will return in 2024. Although the bowlathon as previously implemented is no longer viable, we are introducing an alternate version we hope will be successful in 2024 and beyond.
