<u>Justification</u>: (state briefly why legislative action is requested)

Albany County Mental Health made a portion of the County's Opioid Settlement Funds available to community providers through an RFP process. Agencies and community organizations were permitted to propose initiatives focused on opioid use disorder prevention, treatment or recovery, as well as supportive services such as housing and transportation. Catholic Charities Care Coordination Services' (CCCS) project was selected for funding through an informed review process and will be implemented over the next year.

CCCCS has been a valuable partner to the Department of Mental Health and to community-based treatment providers throughout Albany County. Since its launch in 2016, the LEAD program has resulted in scores of individuals being diverted to substance use disorder treatment in lieu of arrest. Albany's LEAD program was just the third such program implemented in the US and has served as a model for other law enforcement

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diversion efforts.
